

Professor Amanda Ellison PhD

I have been a Trustee with Animal Free Research UK for five years. Having been a neuroscientist for over 20 years, I am deeply passionate about replacing animals in science. I believe animals are not relevant to modern scientific discoveries about humans, nor should they be necessary. During my postdoc fellowship at Oxford University, I helped develop Transcranial Magnetic Stimulation as a technique to better understand the human brain. Because of its animal replacement potential this was funded by Animal Free Research UK, beginning my relationship with the charity.



Joining the Board of Trustees has allowed me to contribute by being the voice of academic research and by discussing conceptual and practical issues surrounding the use of animals in science. There are huge questions to be asked around the human relevance of findings gained from animal research. That's why as an academic science Trustee, it is essential we continue to champion the development of techniques that are credible replacements of animals.

I hope to welcome a new academic science Trustee who has equal passion and determination to transform biomedical research and regulation. By contributing your expertise, I hope you'll be proud to play a significant role in ensuring that the development of treatments for human diseases can be entirely animal free with faster breakthroughs.

OPPORTUNITY

We are seeking a new Trustee with an academic and research background who is deeply passionate about our vision, mission and values, to support the Animal Free Research UK board and team in achieving our charitable aims.

We are looking for an academic scientist who, in addition to their own expertise, has an interest in different scientific methodologies and approaches. This role offers exposure to multiple disciplines of medical research which is both intellectually stimulating and rewarding. You can be at the forefront of shaping a rich research portfolio with a specific aim: to replace animals in medical research. You will have the opportunity to communicate and debate the scientific basis of the work that we fund and the value of that research to human health with your fellow Trustees, stakeholders, supporters and the public. The role is representative of aspects of sitting on a research awards panel with added components of governance and management. It is therefore the perfect opportunity for scientists to develop and/or flex their leadership muscles in a progressive, constructive and solution driven organisation.

The Board ordinarily meets four times per year in London on Saturdays, in January, April, July and October, as well as holding an annual strategy day. Meetings are currently being held remotely due to national and local restrictions. In addition, Trustees are encouraged to join a sub-committee relevant to their area of expertise which meets at least once per quarter via video call. An appropriate time commitment will be required over the course of the year for preparative work between meetings. Trustees are also invited to attend charity events and recruitment panels on an ad hoc basis.

Trustees serve a three-year term, with the option to renew for a further three years. Our current science academic Trustee will support your induction, with a six to nine month handover before stepping down to ensure you feel fully confident in the role.

Trusteeship is an unremunerated position, though reasonable out-of-pocket expenses will be paid.

If this opportunity to join a small but ambitious charity appeals to you, and you have science academic expertise, enthusiasm and a commitment to a vision of a world where human diseases are cured faster without animal suffering then we would like to hear from you.



OUR HISTORY AND ACHIEVEMENTS

Animal Free Research UK was founded in 1970 as Dr Hadwen Trust for Humane Research. The charity was the brainchild of Sidney Hicks, then General Secretary of Cruelty Free International, whose former President was Dr Walter Hadwen (1854-1932). Dr Hadwen was a man ahead of his time who was both a respected physician and committed champion for research without the use of animals.

The founding Trustees had two enduring goals: to play a leading role in funding non-animal replacement research, and to advance and develop widespread support for this endeavour.

Today, Animal Free Research UK is still centred on these founding principles. We continue to demonstrate that cutting-edge human-relevant research is the best way of developing innovative treatments for human diseases without animal suffering.

In 2017 we changed our name from Dr Hadwen Trust to Animal Free Research UK so that our message can be understood more quickly. We wanted our name to reflect the charity's leading position at the forefront of pioneering humane medical research.

In the past 50 years, we have awarded £10 million in grants to over 260 novel research projects. Our researchers have driven forward understanding of debilitating diseases including cancer, dementia and Parkinson's as they affect humans, bringing us closer to effective treatments without harming animals.

We continue to be the UK's leading charity dedicated to funding research which replaces the use of animals in medical research.

WHAT WE LOOK FOR IN OUR TRUSTEES

Ethos

As well as sharing our vision and living our values, Trustees of Animal Free Research UK are aligned with our underlying assumptions that:

- Experiments on animals are ethically unjustified
- Pioneering animal free research provides the best chance of finding treatments for human diseases
- Educating people how to think, not what to think, is the best way to create long lasting change for animals and improve scientific research

Our Trustees all share in the charity's determination to transform medical research and regulation by 2040 so that the development of treatments for human diseases can be entirely animal free and breakthroughs achieved faster.

Competencies

1. Commitment to the charity and ability to put time and effort into the Trustee role
2. Open, honest, collaborative communicator
3. Values-driven with a clear and dynamic vision
4. Able to make sound decisions and take positive risks
5. Inspiring and influencing
6. Empowering of others and dedicated to self-growth
7. Caring, compassionate and self-aware

Skills and experience

All Trustees must be able to demonstrate their ability to fulfil the six key responsibilities of Trustees outlined below, and to understand the legal duties, responsibilities and liabilities of trusteeship.

Previous experience of being a Trustee or working on a committee is useful but not essential.

A recognised scientific degree (under or post graduate) with relevant academic or research experience.

Eligibility

Trustees must be at least 18 years of age and should not have previously been disqualified under the Charities Act.

Role description

The six key responsibilities of Trustees:

The role of a Trustee encompasses six key responsibilities (in partnership with other Trustees) to:

1) Ensure your charity is carrying out its purposes for the public benefit

You and your co-Trustees must make sure that the charity is carrying out the purposes for which it is set up, and no other purpose. This means you should:

- ensure you understand the charity's purposes as set out in its governing document
- plan what your charity will do, and what you want it to achieve
- be able to explain how all of the charity's activities are intended to further or support its purposes
- understand how the charity benefits the public by carrying out its purposes

Spending charity funds on the wrong purposes is a very serious matter; in some cases Trustees may have to reimburse the charity personally.

2) Comply with your charity's governing document and the law

You and your co-Trustees must:

- make sure that the charity complies with its governing document
- comply with charity law requirements and other laws that apply to your charity
- You should take reasonable steps to find out about legal requirements, for example, by reading relevant guidance or taking appropriate advice when you need to

3) Act in your charity's best interests

You must:

- do what you and your co-Trustees (and no one else) decide will best enable the charity to carry out its purposes
- with your co-Trustees, make balanced and adequately informed decisions, thinking about the long term as well as the short term
- avoid putting yourself in a position where your duty to your charity conflicts with your personal interests or loyalty to any other person or body
- not receive any benefit from the charity unless it is properly authorised and is clearly in the charity's interests; this also includes anyone who is financially connected to you, such as a partner, dependent child or business partner

4) Manage your charity's resources responsibly

You must act responsibly, reasonably and honestly. This is sometimes called the duty of prudence. Prudence is about exercising sound judgement. You and your co-Trustees must:

- make sure the charity's assets are only used to support or carry out its purposes
- avoid exposing the charity's assets, beneficiaries or reputation to undue risk
- not over-commit the charity
- take special care when investing or borrowing
- comply with any restrictions on spending funds or selling land

You and your co-Trustees should put appropriate procedures and safeguards in place and take reasonable steps to ensure that these are followed. Otherwise you risk making the charity vulnerable to fraud or theft, or other kinds of abuse, and being in breach of your duty.

5) Act with reasonable care and skill

As someone responsible for governing a charity, you must:

- use reasonable care and skill, making use of your skills and experience and taking appropriate advice when necessary
- give enough time, thought and energy to your role, for example by preparing for, attending and actively participating in all Trustees' meetings

6) Ensure your charity is accountable

You and your co-Trustees must comply with statutory accounting and reporting requirements. You should also:

- be able to demonstrate that your charity is complying with the law, well run and effective
- ensure appropriate accountability to members, if your charity has a membership separate from the Trustees
- ensure accountability within the charity, particularly where you delegate responsibility for particular tasks or decisions to staff or volunteers

In addition to the six key responsibilities, a Trustee should be willing to:

- Represent the organisation as required
- Promote the organisation to a wide range of stakeholders
